INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW

### 1.2 Overview of the Municipality

#### a. Geographic and Demographic Profile

Engcobo is a local municipality within the Chris Hani District of the Eastern Cape bordered by the municipalities of Sakhisizwe, Intsika Yethu, Umbhashe and King Sabata Dalinyebo. The population is largely rural with a minority of urbanites who live in Ngcobo and the peripheral urban nodes of All Saints and Clarkebury. The settlement pattern is dispersed with small villages due to the mountainous and tree covered terrain.

Due to historical factors the land use is predominantly subsistence agriculture with a communal land tenure system. Private land ownership occurs in the urban center of Ngcobo. A mean annual rainfall of approximately 650mm with mild temperatures creates a

perfect climate for agricultural production. The water supply is supplemented by the large perennial rivers of

perennial rivers of Mbashe, Mnyolo, Xuka, Mgwali, and Qumanco.

149 000 people and 31 000 households in the Engcobo municipality (Census 2001) to be changed after 2011 census, live in an area of 2,258.7 ha comprised of 16 wards and 322 villages. A marginal reduction in household size has occurred in conjunction with increased rural urban migration. The population is relatively youthful with a large female to male ratio (Table 1).

#### b. Socio-Economic Context

Majority (97%) of households are indigents with either no income or access to income of less than R940 social grant per month (budget 2008/2009), R560 being for foster care & R220 being for child support grant. This situation indicates that there are high levels of poverty and unemployment in the municipal areas. The situation is exacerbated by the low level of skills within the municipality as indicated in Figure 1. Low skills levels persist even though there are approximately 165 schools and one tertiary institution, 56 949 learners and 1 664 educators located in the Engcobo area of skills. The acquisition of skills is hampered by the condition of educational structures as indicated below:

- 86 schools have permanent structures
- 52 schools have mud structures. This in conjunction with other factors has led to declining attendance at primary and secondary education levels.

### i. Current and potential pillars of the economy

These pillars are small scale Retail, Forestry, Agriculture, Tourism and Crafts & Arts.

#### ii. The retail & wholesale sector

Engcobo is a net consumer of goods and services. As a result the retail and wholesale sector is performing well and growing due to the increasing social grant recipients.

### iii. Forestry

Forestry has the potential to become one of the most productive sectors in the local economy with approximately 5,455ha of forests. The development of a vibrant wood cluster is

currently being investigated through the Integrated Sustainable Rural Development Programme.

The main type of wood found in the local plantations is soft wood commonly from pine trees. The table below gives an inventory of the existing types and names of forest plantations and indigenous forests in the municipal area.

### c. Major Events of the Year

Amongst others here are some of the events we have had during the period are;

- i. The **Mayoral Cup** that was held in May and June 2008. In this event wards competed in Netball and Soccer. Each ward had teams that were competing, and ward winners competed against one another. There were kits given as prizes to those who won.
- ii. During May there was a **Mayoral Imbizo**. This helped in getting people from all the 16 wards under the municipality together so as to inform them about the progress of the municipality, hear their inputs and comments and together plan a way forward that will impact in the final adoption of an IDP& Budget.
- iii. **Silindini Thusong Service Center-** the municipality working together with Lonmin Platinum made sod turn of a building which would be used by all the local sector departments to service the most rural villages. This center is at the birth place of **Tata Walter Sisulu.**

### **2.1 Water Services**

a. Water services delivery strategy and main actors

This is the competency of the District Municipality (*chris hani district municipality*). The Engcobo Local Municipality and the Chris Hani District Municipality have service level agreement in place in which the Local Municipality maintains the urban area only. The Chris Hani District Municipality is the Water Services Authority with reference to section 78 of the water services act.

The following water projects were constructed

- Nkobongo Water Scheme
- Lower Gqaga Water Scheme
- Nkondlo Bulk Water Scheme
- Nkondlo Internal Reticulation Scheme

A large percentage of the population of the Engcobo municipal community still does not have proper water supply.

#### 2.5 Road Maintenance

### a. Road Maintenance Service Delivery Strategy and Main Actors:

it is the competence of the Engcobo Local Municipality construction and maintenance. The Engcobo Local Municipality main focus is on the construction and maintenance of access roads and the Department of Roads and Transport constructs and maintains the district roads.

The Engcobo Local Municipality has been very much fortunate to have the area wide maintainance programme which is being implemented by the Department of Roads and Transport. The area wide programme has been of great assistance to both the Engcobo Local Municipality and its community. The Department assisted the municipality in construction of 20 km of access road which were inaccessible.

The Engcobo Local Municipality has got a huge backlog on access roads that the municipality will take a very long time to eradicate. During the 2007/2008 financial year the municipality constructed the following access roads;

- Sigageni Access Road
- Maganda Access Road
- Blomvak Access Road
- Ngubenguka Access Road

The above mentioned were constructed with the use of construction companies. The Ngubengcuka Access road marked a stepping stone in the municipality's capital projects as this project was the first project to be constructed using labour intensive construction methods.

The Engcobo Municipality does have its own construction equipment which is mainly used for the maintenance of access roads. The equipment assists the municipality in addressing the backlog that the municipality has in maintenance.

#### b. Level and Standards in Road Maintenance Services:

The municipality has got three levels of services namely;

High Urban Area (municipal roads)

Middle District Road (department of roads and transport)

Low Access Roads (municipal roads)

### 2.6 Waste Management

### a. Waste Management Services Delivery Strategy and Main Actors:

At this municipality, the Community Services Department is responsible for the overall cleaning of the Central Business Area/C.B.D. Much work has been covered, and or on a continuous basis is being covered. This project, although it is being undertaken with all enthusiasm, zeal and good attitude at the most, this is a cause for concern and unhappiness amongst all community members including the municipality it's self.

We as the municipality have devised some means, to effectively manage this troublesome waste by dividing our waste management team into two shifts; the morning shift and the afternoon shift. Fewer people work in the morning shift from 7hrs30 up to 16hrs, as the

streets are mostly congested with vehicles in the morning. Much workmanship is dedicated to the afternoon shift, which starts at 13hrs30 up and until 22hrs.

**PERFORMANCE** 

The main actors rage from street cleaners, truck drivers and truck assistants. Each team has its own supervisor, but both teams are jointly headed at the helm by a Refuse Officer. The Manager of the Health and Community Services Department is championing all Health and Community Service related issues including the Waste Management.

### b. Level and Standards in Waste Management Services:

Mostly, if not all of the town shops, have concrete if not drum waste bins in front of their shops, supplied by this municipality. Although some are old but some are new and the municipality has budgeted a lump sum of money for buying new waste drum bins in the financial year 2009/2010. This, in a way has a low impact in the street cleaning of the Engcobo town as whole.

The Engcobo residential places have been divided into days of removing their waste, but in front of their houses. The Time housing part of Engcobo suburban place, her waste is being removed on Mondays of each week, the Dorne valley part, her is being removed every Tuesday of the week. This probably, has a high level access to waste management services.

We are about to source some services of a service provider to cut the ever tall grass caused by the ferocious summer rains, trees and shrubs that are mushrooming on almost all the Engcobo streets.

This on its own shows that, this is a quality standard of waste management service and, by the year 2011, we would have achieved some 66% of the customer satisfaction and a high quality service delivered to the Engcobo town Community.

ii. The fencing of the Land fill site is also a challenge, as at one stage, this site was once fenced with a gate keeper for the access control and keep away the poachers and all unwanted beings. The gate keeper was then beaten up and was grossly hurt. This led to the disappearance of the gate so is the let loose of the poachers and the illegal dumpers. But, twinning with the Engcobo S.A.P.S. would yield good results

iii. Cleaning Equipments: - e.g. the buying of a new extra refuse truck, a generous gesture by the clean loving business community to donate two or three refuse drum/concrete bins.





#### a. Housing and Town Planning Services Delivery Strategy and Main Actors:

The Engcobo Municipality has got the responsibility of providing houses for the community of Engcobo. The Municipality has one housing project know as Engcobo 952. This project has been in construction for a very long time. The project consists of 952 houses to be built and the PHP (peoples housing process) method of construction was use on this project. The multiple methods of executing the project were used as various contractors and skilled labour was used to construct the project.

The Engcobo Municipality does not have a town planning division within the municipality. The technical department of the Engcobo Municipality performs the function of town

planning. The Municipality has requested the DBSA (Development Bank of Southern Africa) to assist the municipality through its learner ship program to provide the municipality with a town planner.

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

An appropriate legislation was complied with, in order to provide statements for the year ending 30 June 2008. To the best of my knowledge these financial statements are a fair presentation of the Council at the end of the abovementioned date and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

## 2.1 Commentary on the operating results

## <u>Revenue</u>

The total operating revenue was below the budget by 40%. Among the factors resulting in this variance was the under recovery in water revenue as well as refuse income.

#### Operational expenditure

Total operational expenditure budget amounts to R36 108 863 and the capital expenditure budget amounts to R8 005 000 resulting in an overall expenditure budget of R44 113 863. Actual operational expenditure is R36 568 509 and actual capital expenditure is R 8 534 469 resulting in an overall actual expenditure of R45 102 978.

<sup>3.1</sup> Commentary on capital expenditure and financing

The capital expenditure exceeded the budget by 6%. The major contributing factors were unbudgeted expenditure that was incurred in the period under review i.e. Land & Buildings, Computer Equipment, Storm water and Community Halls.

The total amount of the capital expenditure was financed through unconditional grant subsidies.

#### 4. EXTERNAL LOANS INVESTMENTS AND CASH

The municipality has an external loan of R4 million obtained from Chris Hani District Municipality. This loan bears no interest and is payable within the 2008 / 2009 financial year.

The R6.8m decrease in accumulated funds is reflective of an under recovery of 40% on operating income and 6% over expenditure on capital expenditure respectively as referred to above. The overall deficit of R6.8m was financed through the loan R4 m from Chris Hani District Municipality and the equitable share investments.

#### POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

No material events have occurred since the balance sheet date.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

For the year ended 30 June 2008

#### 1. Basis of presentation

- 1.1 The financial statements have been prepared so as to conform to the standards laid down by the Institute of Municipal Treasures and Accountants in its Code of Accounting Practice (1997) and on Report on Published Annual Financial Statements (Second edition January 1996).
- 1.2 The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis, adjusted for capital expenditure as more fully detailed in note 2. The accounting policies are consistent with those applied in previous years, except if otherwise indicated.
- 1.3 The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis as stated:
  - Income is accrued when measured and available. Certain direct income is accrued when received, such as grants.
  - Expenditure is accrued in the year it is incurred.

#### 2. Consolidation

The balance sheet includes Rate and General Services, Housing Service, Trading Services and the different funds, reserves and provisions. All inter-departmental charges are set-off against each other, with the exception of assessment rates, refuse removal, sewerage, which are treated as income and expenditure in the respective departments.

#### 3. Fixed Assets

- 3.1 Fixed assets are stated at cost or valuation where assets have been acquired by grant or donation, while they are in existence and fit for use.
- 3.2 Depreciation: The balance shown against the heading "Loans Redeemed and other Capital Receipts" in the notes to the balance sheet is tantamount to a provision for depreciation; however certain structural differences do exist. Through this "provision" assets are written down over their estimated useful life.

In the case of operating income the full cost of the acquired asset becomes a direct charge to the income statement. Loans are repaid within the estimated useful lives of assets acquired through such loans. The cost or value of such asset as financed is immediately credited to the "Loans Redeemed and other Capital Receipts" accounts.

Grant or donation, where the amount representing the value of such grant or donation is immediately credited to the "Loans Redeemed and other Capital Receipts" account.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)**

for the year ended 30 June 2008

- 3.3 All net proceeds from the sale of fixed property are credited to the Revolving fund. Net proceeds from the sale of other assets are credited to Income or the Accumulated Surplus Account.
- 3.4 Capital assets are financed from operating income and grants received from National and Provincial Governments
- 3.5 Leases are classified as finance leases where substantially all risks and rewards associated with the ownership of the asset are transferred to the municipality.

#### 4. Trust Funds

Transactions relating to funds held by the Council for the benefit of third parties accounted for only in the balance sheet with no recognition of income or expenditure in the income statement.

From time to time, National and Provincial Governments provide funds to Municipalities for the undertaking of certain prescribed projects. The funds so provided are not treated as operational grants upon receipt but revenue is recognized only upon spending of the funds for the designated purpose, to the extent of the expenditure. Funds that are set aside for projects will only be utilized for that specific project.

Revolving fund was calculated at 7.5% on previous financial year assessment rates

#### 5. Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the municipality has a present or a constructive obligation as a result of past events and is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the provision can be made. Provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. Provision for doubtful debts is set at 41.99% of the total debtors amount.

#### 6. Retirement benefits

All employees are contributing to the pension fund.

#### 7. Surpluses and deficits

Any surpluses or deficits arising from the operation of services are transferred to Rate and General Services.

## 8. Treatment of administration and other overhead expenses

The cost of internal support services are transferred to the different services in accordance with the IMFO's Report on Accounting for Support Services.

#### 9. Investments

Investments are shown at the lower of cost or market value if a permanent decline in the value occurred, and are invested according to the provisions contained in Circular 26 of 1991 issued by the Provincial Administration.

## 10. Income Recognition

#### **Electricity and water billings**

Only water is provided by the municipality.

All meters are read and billed monthly. Where meters cannot be read during a particular month, they are provisionally billed with the necessary adjustments made in the month they are indeed read.

## **Assessment Rates**

Assessment rates are levied on the land value of the property.

#### 11. Sale of fixed property/stands

The revenue generated through the sale of fixed assets must be allocated to the Land Trust Fund.

REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL TO THE EASTERN CAPE PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE AND COUNCIL ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE INFORMATION OF ENGCOBO LOCAL MUNICIPALITY FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2008

#### REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Introduction

1. I was engaged to audit the accompanying financial statements of the Engcobo Local Municipality which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2008, Income statement and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes, as set out on pages ....to....

## Responsibility of the accounting officer for the financial statements

- 2. The accounting officer is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the basis of accounting determined by the National Treasury, as set out in accounting policy note 1 to the financial statements and in the manner required by the Local Government: Municipal Finance Management Act, 2003 (Act No. 56 of 2003) (MFMA) and the Division of Revenue Act, 2007 (Act 5 of 2007) (DORA). This responsibility includes:
  - designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error
  - selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies
  - Making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

## Responsibility of the Auditor-General

3. As required by section 188 of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996 read with section 4 of the Public Audit Act, 2004 (Act No. 25 of 2004) (PAA), my responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on conducting the audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing and *General Notice 616 of 2008*, issued in *Government Gazette No. 31057 of 15 May 2008*. Because of the matters discussed in the Basis for disclaimer of opinion paragraphs, however, I was not able to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to provide a basis for an audit opinion.

## Basis of accounting

4. The municipality's policy is to prepare financial statements on the basis of accounting determined by the National Treasury, in accordance with the standards laid down by the Institute of Municipal Finance Officers in its code of Accounting Practice (1997) and on Report on Published Annual Financial Statements (Second

#### REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

edition – January 1996) as set out in accounting policy note 1 to the financial statements.

## Basis for disclaimer of opinion

## Property, plant and equipment

- 5. In terms of section 62(1) (b) of the MFMA, the accounting officer should ensure that full and proper records of the financial affairs of the entity are kept. However, adequate control has not been exercised over the fixed assets register during the year under review and as a result the fixed asset register is not completely and adequately maintained. It has also been noted that reconciliation between assets register and general ledger is not done. Consequently, during the verification process of assets in the fixed assets register, fixed assets additions of R8,5 million could not be identified in the fixed assets register. Accordingly completeness and valuation of fixed assets amounting to (R13 547) disclosed in the financial statement could not be confirmed.
- 6. Supporting documentation in respect of journal entries amounting to R15,1 million processed through the fixed assets account balance were not submitted for audit purposes and I could not determine the impact of these transactions in the financial statements.

#### **Funds and Reserves**

- 7. The revolving fund is disclosed in the financial statements with an amount of R729 411. However the dedicated investment account is reflected in the bank statement with an amount of R73 877 resulting to a difference of R655 534. Accordingly the revolving fund has been overstated by the same amount as it is not adequately backed by concomitant assets.
- 8. Supporting documentation in respect of journal entries amounting to R25, 2 million processed through funds and reserves and accumulated surplus/ (deficit) account were not submitted for audit purposes. I was unable to determine the impact of these journals in the accounting records as my scope was limited
- 9. Supporting documentation authorising the transfer amounting to R2, 2 million made by the municipality from the funds and reserves to its operating bank account was not submitted for audit purposes. I was therefore unable to determine the impact of the transfer in the accounting records as my scope was limited.

#### REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

- 10. Engcobo Local Municipality made a prior year adjustment indicating that monies received in respect of conditional grants should be taken straight to revenue instead of creating a fund. Furthermore it was noted that allocation amounting to R14 million made in terms of Division of Revenue Act in respect of these grants was not disclosed. Accordingly revenue has been understated in the financial statements by R14 million.
- 11. With reference to accounting policy number 4, paragraph 2: statutory funds, trust funds and project funds, from time to time, National and Provincial Governments provide funds to municipalities for the undertaking of certain prescribed projects. The funds so provided are not treated as operating grants upon receipts but revenue is recongnized only upon spending of the funds for the designated purposes, to the extent of the expenditure. However expenses amounting to R42,7 million and incurred in respect of funds were not recognized as revenue during the period under review and supporting documentation detailing the purpose and use of grants received was not submitted for audit purposes. Accordingly revenue has been understated in the financial statements by the same amount.

## Cash and Cash Equivalents

- 12. Bank confirmation received from the bank, confirmed an amount of R2.2 million whereas the bank statement used in the preparation of bank reconciliations and cash book of the municipality reflect an amount of R863 823 in respect of cash and bank resulting to a difference of R1,3 million. Accordingly cash and bank has been understated in the financial statements.
- 13. Monitoring controls such as reviews and reconciliations were not effective at Engcobo Local Municipality and as a result amounts totalling to R747 715 in respect of reconciling items are not cleared. Accordingly, valuation and completeness of cash and bank balance of R863 823 as disclosed in the annual financial statements could not be confirmed.

## **Accounts Payable**

- 14. Included in the creditors of R9,4 million is the amount of R8 million in respect of internal advances (not disclosed in appendix B) borrowed from conditional grants without council approval and the institution from which such grant was received. Consequently, funds and reserves are understated by R8 million.
- 15. Supporting documentation in respect of journal entries amounting to R7,8 million, processed through the creditors account were not submitted for audit purpose. I was therefore unable to determine the impact of these journals in the accounting records as my scope was limited.
- 16. The creditors' suspense accounts disclosed as other deposits of R1,3 million per note 10 to the annual financial statements, are in respect of deposits from consumers that are outstanding and not cleared at year end. Furthermore, supporting documentation that I deemed necessary to verify the existence, valuation and rights and obligations of the balance was not submitted for audit purposes. The

municipality's records did not permit the application of alternative audit procedures regarding the suspense accounts.

#### Value Added Tax

- 17. Monitoring controls such as reviews and reconciliations were not effective at Engcobo Local Municipality and as a result reconciliation between VAT 201 returns for the amount of R2, 4 million in respect of value added tax submitted to South African Revenue Services and the general ledger were not performed during the period under review. Accordingly completeness and valuation of VAT disclosed in the financial statements could not be confirmed.
- 18. Value Added Tax (VAT) amounting to R2,4 million as per note 3 to the financial statements differs with VAT amount of R1, 2 million as confirmed by the receiver of revenue (SARS). Accordingly accounts receivable has been overstated in the financial statements by the same amount.

#### **Accounts Receivable**

- 19. The debtors ageing analysis in respect of rates and service receivable submitted for audit purposes reflects a balance of R2, 4 million whereas as per note 3.1 to the financial statements an amount of R2, 6 million is disclosed. Accordingly, debtors have been understated by R215 539. Consequently valuation and rights and obligation could not be confirmed.
- 20. Supporting documentation in respect of journals processed in the account receivable amounting to R956 961 was not provided for audit purposes and as a result I could not confirm valuation of transactions.
- 21. With reference to paragraphs 3.6 of the credit control by-law for Engcobo Local Municipality, interest will be charged on all overdue accounts at an interest rate that shall be determined by the council from time to time. The municipality did not charge interest on long outstanding debtors for the current year and previous years. As the relevant information was not available I was not able to determine what the impact of this would be on accounts receivable, however considering the outstanding debtors at year end this amount is estimated to be material.

#### **Investments**

- 22. The Investment register is not completely and accurately populated and is therefore not adequately maintained and supported by appropriate documentation. Consequently, the difference totalling R908 996 between investment register and general ledger was noted. Investments are thus understated by the same amount.
- 23. Monitoring control such as reviews and reconciliations were not effective at Engcobo Local Municipality during the period under review and as a result the investment amounts recorded in the general ledger and disclosed in note 5 to the financial statements did no reconcile to the investment amount in the general ledger. Consequently a difference totalling R8,3 million was noted. Accordingly valuation and completeness of investment could not be confirmed

- 24. Monitoring controls such as reviews and reconciliations were not effective at Engcobo Local Municipality during the period under review and as a result an amount of R2 million in respect of investments as per the investment register was recorded as a negative balance of R916 680 in the general ledger. Consequently the financial statements were understated by the investment amounting of R2,9 million.
- 25. Interest earned totalling R644 237 in respect of investments as disclosed in the financial statements, could not be confirmed per bank confirmations received from the bank where investments are held by the municipality and as a result, accuracy of interest earned could not be confirmed.

#### Revenue

26. Supporting documentation for debit journal entries amounting to R62 700 and credit journals amounting to R12,3 million processed in the grants and subsidies account was not submitted for audit purposes and I was therefore, unable to determine the impact of transactions in the accounting records as my scope was limited.

## **Employee Costs**

- 27. Employment contracts in respect of employee costs of R933 907, incurred by the municipality were not submitted for audit purposes. I could therefore, not satisfy myself of the occurrence and accuracy of salaries, wages and allowance expenditure as my scope was limited.
- 28. Supporting documentation for the expenditure of R308 73 in respect of the mayoral fund was not submitted for audit purposes. Accordingly occurrence and accuracy of general expenditure disclosed in the financial statements could not be confirmed.
- 29. Monitoring controls such as reviews and reconciliations, were not effective at Engcobo Local Municipality during the period under review and as a result, a difference between the trial balance and purchase vouchers amounting to R812 044 in respect of fuel, audit fees and hiring of equipment was noted and no management explanation was provided for audit purposes. Accordingly general expenditure might be overstated in the financial statements.
- 30. Supporting documentation in respect of journals processed in the general expenditure and repairs and maintenance accounts amounting to R2 million was not submitted for audit purposes, and as a result I could not determine the impact of the transactions as my scope was limited.

## Capital commitments

31. The municipality did not maintain a contracts register which provides particulars of all approved capital contracts, the expenditure incurred to date and the municipality's future capital commitments in respect of each contract. There were no alternative audit procedures that I could perform to obtain reasonable assurance that capital commitments to the sum of R11,5 million as disclosed under note 23 to

the financial statements, are complete and recorded in the financial statements at appropriate amounts.

## **Irregular Expenditure**

32. In terms of the Engcobo Local Municipality's supply chain management policy and chapter 11 of the MFMA, a municipality shall award contracts for goods and services in accordance with a system that is fair, equitable, transparent, competitive and cost-effective. The following irregular expenditure was identified because the above was not complied with. Furthermore, this expenditure was not disclosed in the financial statements as irregular expenditure as required by section 125(2)(d) of the MFMA.

Bids for the supply of goods and /or services were not invited as required by supply chain management regulation 17. A payment of R15,7 million was made. Furthermore the municipality did not enter into service level agreements/contracts with service providers who were awarded tenders to provide goods and or services.

## **Unauthorised Expenditure**

- 33. The municipality has incurred an unauthorized expenditure of R985 115 as its budget has been exceeded by the same amount. However the municipality has not disclosed this amount in the notes to financial statements as required by section 125(2)(d)(i) of the MFMA.
- 34. The municipality has incurred expenditure amounting to R8 million for purposes other than those stipulated per conditions of a relevant grant and as a result unauthorized expenditure has been incurred. However the municipality has not complied with section 125(2)(d)(i) of the aforementioned Act by not disclosing a note to the financial statements to this effect.

#### **Related Parties**

35. I was unable to obtain the representations considered necessary from the accounting officer with respect to the identification and balances of, and transactions with related parties. I could not determine the effect on the disclosures contained in the financial statements.

### **Contingent Liabilities**

36. The municipality does not maintain an updated register of litigations against it, and legal council responsibilities are outsourced to a legal representative (attorneys, lawyers and advocates) of whose list was not provided to me and thus I could not adequately obtain confirmations regarding litigations against the municipality. There were no alternative audit procedures that I could perform to obtain reasonable assurance that contingent liabilities do not exist on the part of the municipality.

## Disclaimer of opinion

37. Because of the significance of the matters described in the Basis for disclaimer of opinion paragraphs, I have not been able to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to provide a basis for an audit opinion on the financial statements of the

Engcobo Local Municipality. Accordingly, I do not express an opinion on the financial statements.

## **Emphasis of matters**

I draw attention to the following matters:

## Amendments to the applicable basis of accounting

38. The National Treasury approved a deviation from the basis of accounting applicable to the municipality in terms of General Notice 522 of 2007, issued in Government Gazette No. 30013 of 29 June 2007.

#### **OTHER MATTERS**

I draw attention to the following matters that relate to my responsibilities in the audit of the financial statements:

#### **Internal control**

39. Section 62(1)(c)(i) of the MFMA states that the accounting officer must ensure that the municipality has and maintains effective, efficient and transparent systems of financial and risk management and internal control. The table below depicts the root causes that gave rise to the inefficiencies in the system of internal control, which led to the disclaimer of opinion. The root causes are categorised according to the five components of an effective system of internal control. In some instances deficiencies exist in more than one internal control component.

<u>Control environment</u>: establishes the foundation for the internal control system by providing fundamental discipline and structure for financial reporting.

<u>Risk assessment</u>: involves the identification and analysis by management of relevant financial reporting risks to achieve predetermined financial reporting objectives.

<u>Control activities</u>: policies, procedures and practices that ensure that management's financial reporting objectives are achieved and financial reporting risk mitigation strategies are carried out.

<u>Information and communication</u>: supports all other control components by communicating control responsibilities for financial reporting to employees and by providing financial reporting information in a form and time frame that allows people to carry out their financial reporting duties.

<u>Monitoring</u>: covers external oversight of internal controls over financial reporting by management or other parties outside the process; or the application of independent methodologies, like customised procedures or standard checklists, by employees within a process.

## Material Non-compliance with applicable legislation

- 40. Municipal Finance Management Act, 2003 (MFMA)
  - Section 72(1) (a) states that the accounting officer of a municipality must by 25 January of each year, assess the performance of the municipality during the first half of the financial year. Engcobo Local municipality did not provide me with evidence that an assessment as required by this section was performed.
  - Section 17(3)(b) of the MFMA was not complied with as measurable performance objectives for revenue from each source and for each vote in the budget, taking into account the municipality's integrated development plan, was not compiled and presented with the annual budget.
- 41. Municipal Systems Act, 2000 (Act No. 32 of 2000) (MSA)
  - Section 57(1) and (2) was not complied with as I was not provided with performance agreements of the section 57 managers for 2007/08 as they were not in place.
- 42. Housing Act, 1997(Act 107 of 1997)

- Section 10(4f) of the Housing Act No 107 of 1997 states that the Chief Financial Officer of the municipality must as soon as possible after, but within two months of 31 March in each year submit a signed detailed statement, showing the results of previous year's transactions and the balance sheet in respect of such account (housing fund) to the accounting officer. However Engcobo Local Municipality has not prepared any detailed statement of People's housing project funded by the provincial housing fund.
- 43. The Division of Revenue Act, 2007 (Act 5 of 2007) (DORA)
  - Section 27 (5)(b) and (6) of DORA 2007, states that the municipality must issue quarterly reports to the National Treasury in the prescribed format for all grants received and expenditure incurred on the grants. The municipality did not issue the aforementioned quarterly reports.

## Matters of governance

44. The MFMA tasks the accounting officer with a number of responsibilities concerning financial and risk management and internal control. Fundamental to achieving this is the implementation of certain key governance responsibilities, which I have assessed as follows:

45. I have reviewed the performance information as set out on pages xx to xx.

# Responsibility of the accounting officer for the performance information

46. In terms of section 121(3) (c) of the MFMA, the annual report of a municipality must include the annual performance report of the municipality prepared by the municipality in terms of section 46 of the MSA.

## Responsibility of the Auditor-General

47. I conducted my engagement in accordance with section 13 of the PAA read with General Notice 616 of 2008, issued in Government Gazette No. 31057 of 15 May 2008 and section 45 of the MSA.

- 48. In terms of the foregoing my engagement included performing procedures of an audit nature to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence about the performance information and related systems, processes and procedures. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement.
- 49. I believe that the evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for the audit findings reported below.

## Audit findings (performance information)

## Internal auditing of performance measurements

50. The internal auditors of the municipality did not audit the performance measurements on a continuous basis and did not submit quarterly reports on their audits to the municipal manager and the performance audit committee.

## Performance management plan not yet approved by council

51. Section 40 of the MSA requires a municipality to establish mechanisms to monitor and review its performance management system. Council has not yet approved Engcobo Local Municipality Performance Management Plan.

## Measurable objectives not consistent

# Measurable objectives are materially inconsistent between annual report and integrated development plan

- 52. I draw attention to the fact that the measurable objectives reported in the annual report of the municipality are materially inconsistent when compared with the predetermined objectives as per the integrated development plan.
- 53. Section 46 of the MSA states that a municipality must prepare for each financial year a performance report reflecting the performance of the municipality and of each external service provider during that financial year, a comparison of the performances referred to in paragraph (a) with targets set for and performances in the previous financial year and measures taken to improve the performance. The municipality has not complied with these requirements and as a result I could not determine if the municipality reported against predetermined objectives.

#### APPRECIATION
